Principal's View

Tena koutou e te whānau

It seems like quite some time ago that the Commonwealth Games were happening, however there was a post race interview with New Zealand's Sam Tanner following the 1500m run event that really resonated with me. He placed 6th in this event and he said to the reporter "I think I'm the happiest 6th place getter ever". Sam had goals that he had set, which he achieved along with getting a new personal best. Sam measured his success against himself, and whilst he didn't walk away with a medal he knew that he had 'won' as he gave his all in the race. I wonder if all those watching Sam saw him as a winner? Does it matter what the rest of us thought about whether he was successful or not?

Having been ruminating on this interview, I have been thinking about our STAR value: Strive for Success and what is success? Pondering what success is, is not a new train of thought for me - I have spent quite a bit of time in my own thoughts, and in discussion with friends, families and colleagues about what is success? How does society define success and what do we see success as at HSS? What might be unconsciously impacting what we think success is? I have long held the belief that success should only be measured against oneself, because success does look so different for each and everyone one of us, which is why I love that our Strive for Success STAR focuses on 'always trying our best'. But do we understand what this truly means?

As a school we are continually looking at ways to further understand what success is, including listening to feedback from tamariki and whānau. I always enjoy listening to our tamariki talk about the effort that they have been putting into their learning, into looking after our school, caring for their friends and family and for being kind to themselves.

I think it is fair to say that <u>Sam Tanner's interview</u> certainly raised a lot of questions and points of reflection for me, and perhaps it may do the same for you. I wonder how you might describe success and how your tamariki might describe it? Maybe you might like to ask your child if they placed 6th would they feel success and then show them the interview? As a parent in quite a busy household, I'm often trying to think about conversations to have at the 'dinner table' that will create an opportunity for all of the whānau to engage with (bearing in mind I have a 14 year old son who is currently only saying one or two words in a sentence), and I think this topic of conversation might support this! I may even consider starting the conversation with the following quote from Maya Angelou "success is liking yourself, liking what you do, and liking how you do it".






