Principal's View

Tena koutou e te whānau

Every election year schools, and education in general, find themselves at the centre of a match of political football. In an effort to gain the popular vote, generally the commentary starts around what's wrong with our education system, and often the focus is on things that connect with the older generation, like talking about going "back to the basics". Having been a principal for over 20 years, I have heard it all. It would be great if education could be removed from politics, and bipartisan agreements were made between parties based on a well-researched aspirational vision for our tamariki.

The industrial action going on in the education sector at the moment is a disruption for our students, who really don't need it after the past three years of the pandemic. However, we are heading for a real staffing crisis if many of the issues highlighted are not addressed. Hampden Street School has never had issues filling vacancies with high quality teachers, and generally, we have had an abundance of relief teachers to choose from. We feel very lucky to have secured Nic Thomassen and Brodie Spence into the fold of our Middle Syndicate in fixed term positions, and we are still recruiting for a position starting next term in our Senior Syndicate.

In terms of relief teachers, we have had days when we simply couldn't get relievers, and we have had to pull teachers from their classroom or leadership release. This puts extra stress on teachers who get behind in their work and leadership tasks. On a number of days when we have had sick teachers and haven't been able to get a relief teacher, we have been forced to split classes. This is our last resort, as it not only disrupts the sick teacher's class but all the classes that take students in.

Quite simply, we need more teachers. We are already in the midst of a teacher supply crisis. We need to attract good candidates into teaching, and to do this, we need to make the job more attractive. This starts with pay but also includes things like release time and pastoral support.

Schools are a great place to work, and working with children is so rewarding. At Hampden Street, we want to ensure our team is composed of committed, enthusiastic practitioners. For this to happen, we need to continue to attract strong fields of applicants.

What a fantastic response to our 'dress in pink' day, in support of the Mental Health Foundation, last Friday. Over \$260.00 was raised for the foundation.












Emanuel's Battery Collection

Working Bee

It's hard to believe that we are only a month or so away from the opening of our amazing new Junior Block. In the next few weeks, we will start to formulate a step-by-step plan on what, who, and when certain things will be moved. Although a lot will happen during the last week of school, we have also set a holiday working bee time for staff and whānau to come and help with various tasks around the school. Blessing of the Junior Block

Our new Junior Block will officially open on Monday, 17 July. We will start proceedings with a dawn blessing ceremony. The event will be run in partnership with our kaitiaki iwi, Rangitāne. This ceremony will include karakia, speeches, and shared kai. All whānau and tamariki are warmly invited. Following this event, we hold our Term 3 Mihi Whakatau to welcome new students.

Access Blocked

Next Wednesday, through to the end of the week, the access way by the corner of the new Junior Block/old school bell will again be closed as the groundworks are finished in preparation for the last of the concrete to be laid.

529 Garage

529 Garage is a free web-based registration system created in Canada and proven to reduce bike theft by 40%. 529 Garage has already been pushed in New Zealand by police and councils in various districts.

529 Garage helps the cycling community to reduce bike theft. You can register bike details and serial numbers; in the event your bike is stolen you can notify the 529 Garage community by creating an alert. Then if the thief tries to sell the stolen bike, potential buyers can search 529 Garage to check if the bike is stolen. This will help to deter thieves as they find they have a much smaller market to sell to. Members of the 529 Garage community and police can check bikes and if they are stolen, notify the owner and reunite them with their bike.




Bike registration is free, and a 529 Shield sticker is

an optional, tamper-resistant, weather-resistant decal that has a unique, seven-character ID code. It adds an extra identifier and layer of protection for your bike. The 529 Shield sticker can be purchased from all good bike stores, we recommend you put one on your bike in a visible location. Always report bike thefts to police, call 105 or go online to 105.police.govt.nz.




