On Friday night, we held one of our annual fundraising events, the HSS Quiz. It was a fantastic night that not only raised a lot of money for the school but was also a wonderful community event. This year's quiz raised a record \$21,837.22. This is an amazing effort and would not have been possible without the generous support of many local businesses and individuals who supplied prizes, auction items, and food items. A special thanks has to go to McCashin's Brewery, who donated all the beer and cider for our bar.

We are extremely lucky to have such a proactive HSS Fundraising Committee. In many urban schools, the PTA is a thing of the past. However, for the 16 years I have been at HSS, we have always had strong support for our fundraising events, driven by a dedicated committee.

This year, funds from the HSS Fundraising Committee have helped pay for furniture in our new Junior Block, new library books and shelving, and new sports uniforms. 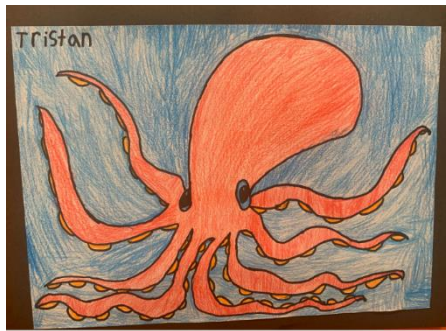

"I have enjoyed learning about birds, especially making my poster about Moa." Louie Room 16

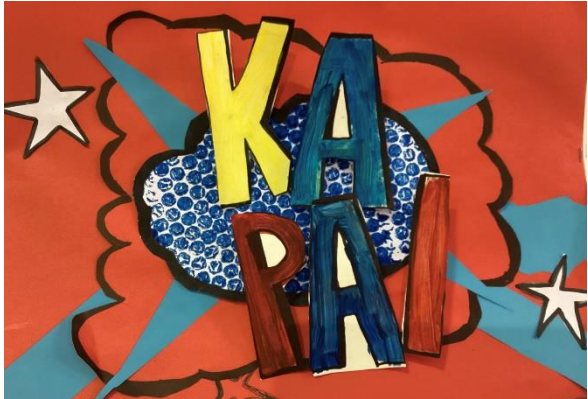
