Principal's View

Tena koutou e te whānau

Welcome back to Hampden Street School for Term 3. It was such a great day on Monday, starting with the blessing ceremony for our beautiful new junior block. This very special event was hosted in partnership with our kaitiaki iwi, Rangitāne o Wairau. The ceremony was both uplifting and moving. It marks a huge milestone for our school as we complete a building redevelopment process that started over 12 years ago. This 12 year span has at times been challenging with the disruption it has brought for staff, students, and whānau. However, each step of this redevelopment meant that our school was moving forward towards our goal of being fully MLE (Modern Learning Environment) compliant - the standard set by the Ministry of Education for a 21st century classroom. From my understanding, we are the only school in the region to achieve full MEL compliance.

The other wonderful outcome of our blessing ceremony was our collaboration with Rangitāne o Wairau, our kaitiaki/guardians who led the blessing and breathed life into the new classrooms in preparation for our tamariki to learn in these new spaces. Our HSS whenua/land was returned to Rangitāne o Wairau as part of their Treaty Settlement. As a school, we are seeking ways to continue building this partnership as we all share in the kaitiaki responsibility for our school. This blessing ceremony was a really positive starting point, from which I know this relationship will flourish.

Finally, a huge thank you to everyone who came along to our blessing ceremony. It was a very special event. Special thanks to Greg Hornsby for preparing and organising our Te Kakano performers, Helen Kersten and Susan Skeggs for preparing our beautiful kai, Janet Arcus for all her help and support in the lead up to the event, John Hippolite and Amy Humphries for ensuring our school grounds looked so inviting, and Dean Francois for all his help and organisation in the lead up to this milestone.

Have a great term, everyone, and I look forward to catching up with you soon.

Term 3 Whānau Conferences

If an in-person conference is not suitable, then please contact your child's kaiako to arrange an alternative. **Room 6 and Kōwhai 13 will have a separate event**, as communicated by Tom Marston and Zoe Allen. **Event details and a booking code will be emailed to the whānau of these classes**, **next week**.

The discussion for these will focus around your child's progress academically and socially to date this year, and to unpack where they sit in relation to curriculum levels for their year. Teachers will be using this term's Mid-Year reports as a basis for the discussion. We encourage all tamariki to attend their whānau conference, as it is a great opportunity for supporting our tamariki in developing the ability to talk about their learning.

There is also the option to make a booking with our Principal, Don McLean, Deputy Principal, Jade Royds, or our Learning Support Co-ordinator, Tracy McLaren.

School will finish at the earlier time of 2.00pm on Tuesday 25 July.

Many thanks to all of our whānau who have already signed up for a conference, and completed the <u>supervision form</u> to help us identify for health and safety reasons who has permission to leave at 2.00pm, or who will need to stay until 3.00pm on Tuesday 25 July. We ask that all families please complete the supervision form by 3.00pm Monday 24 July. The supervision form will need to be completed for tamariki in Kōwhai 13 and Room 6.

Drop Off/Pick Up Times

Just a reminder that we encourage children to arrive at school after 8:15am in the mornings. Teachers are often not in their classrooms until after 8:30am depending on before school meetings, resource preparation etc.

After school our expectation is that children have left the school by 3:15pm. Once again staff are busy after school with meetings and are not available to supervise students.



We have a sign in/out tablet at the office. If a child arrives late, leaves during the day for any reason or leaves early, they need to use the sign in/out tablet. It connects with our Student Management System and updates a student's attendance information automatically.

Last Day of the 2023 School Year

With being halfway through the year, it is timely that we share that the last day of the 2023 school year is Tuesday 19 December. We will be finishing school at 12.30pm on this day. Further details about final assemblies will be shared at a later date.

0275 ABSENT

If your child is going to be absent, you must contact the school. You can text your child's absence to our absence text line. Just text 0275 ABSENT (0275 227368) and leave your child's name, class number and reason for their absence. Alternatively, you can call the school and leave a message or email the school office. You can do this at any time prior to the start of the school day.

Even if you have let your child's classroom teacher know about the absence, please let the office know too as the teacher's don't always have time to check their messages or there may be a reliever teacher in the class.

Sushi is **ordered on a Thursday for Friday lunch**. Cash payment is required for sushi as we collect the money on behalf of the sushi suppliers. Orders are taken between 8:30am and 9:00am at the school hall on Thursday mornings.

Climate Action Story


