# **Principal's View**

### Tena koutou e te whānau

Often, we have parents ask us about internet safety and screen time at school. It is a hot topic, and the speed of change in the digital world can sometimes seem overwhelming. As a school, we are very lucky because our network is managed by the Government's Network for Learning (N4L). This network provides us with the filters and firewalls that prevent tamariki from accessing many of the things that, in an unfiltered home network, could be relatively easy to access.

We are aware of the need to carefully choose which digital tools we use to support learning, and also recognise that using a device is not always the best platform. In fact, we want our tamariki to be following processes of design and bringing creative ideas to fruition that don't always involve digital tools. However, we would be underserving our learners if we didn't encourage them to use digital tools within areas of their learning programme. When working in the office, I would use my computer 85% of the time and maybe a pen and paper for the other 15%. I would never dream of handwriting a letter or report for the board. My situation here is typical of most workplaces, so like knowing how to read, write and being mathematically literate, the ability to navigate the digital world has become an essential life skill.

As teachers and parents one of the many roles we juggle is to help our children safely navigate this fast-changing digital world. The recent advancement of AI technology in things such as Chat GTP has added another layer of complexity, and I have heard of schools that have decided to make learners submit handwritten assignments, so they know that it is the students' work. Obviously, this approach is a step backwards, and rather than shutting out technology that is going to be here to stay, we need to invest time into understanding how the technology will enhance learning. We need to support our children in using the digital tools available in an ethical manner.

The digital world can seem a little bit like heading into a dark cave without a flashlight, but it's okay for us to walk alongside our children and learn together as we go. That way, when faced with a challenge, children can see you as the learner, and problems can be solved together.

### Children's Asthma Study in Nelson

New Zealand has one of the highest rates of asthma in the world, with onein-seven tamariki taking asthma medication. Asthma is also one of the most common causes of hospitalisation in children/tamariki, with Māori and Pacific Island tamariki up to three times more likely to be admitted than other groups. This study has been approved by the Ministry of Health (Health and Disability Ethics Committees), and is sponsored by MRINZ (Medical Research Institute of New Zealand).

If a child qualifies for the study, their inhalers will be provided free of charge, they will have free breathing tests and asthma education, receive a koha/gift card after each visit and parents will be reimbursed for travel expenses, for each visit. The duration of the study is just over one year (56 weeks), which includes six in-person clinic visits.

Clinical research has the safety and ethical concerns of the participants at the centre of the process. Staff have been police-vetted and they have a child



safety policy, they are all medical professionals. They work with the parents, whanau and the GP of the young person through a consenting process and would be very happy to talk further about the study and any questions you might have.
