Principal's View

Tena koutou e te whānau

Recently, I shared our Term 2 attendance data with the Board of Trustees. The report showed that only 57.1% of Hampden Street tamariki attended school regularly for the term. This means that out of a total roll of 436 only 249 of our learners were here 90% or more of the term, averaging 9/10 days per fortnight. This was quite a significant drop from our Term 1 data that saw 70.3% of our tamariki attending regularly (90%+).

The Ministry of Education's Attendance and Engagement Strategy was released by the Government last year in response to the concerns around the long-term trend of low school attendance and disengagement from learning and the impact this has. The strategy includes targets for attendance levels, starting with a target of 70% of our tamariki attending school regularly (90% or more).

Research shows that attendance at school is habit forming and that habits made at primary school will be reflected right through a child's school journey, whether that habit is a good one of regular attendance or one of high absences.

Looking at the next attendance bracket (80% - 90%) for Term 2, our figures show that we had 31% (135/436) attending at this level of frequency. At 80% attendance, this equates to a child having one day a week off school over a year.

The challenge with these figures that I need to acknowledge is that they include justified absences such as sickness (we don't want children to come to school if they are unwell) or attending a funeral or tangi, as well as the unjustified absences. Over the coming weeks we will be drilling further down into the data but an initial review highlights that a significant number of tamariki were absent from school due to being on holiday, which is not a justified absence.

Holidays during term time have always been a dilemma for me, as I appreciate that the holiday experiences provide many positive learning opportunities, experiences and special family time. However it is difficult to quantify the family holiday and all that they offer versus the gains made from consistently attending school, particularly when there are 12 weeks of holidays throughout the year.

The Ministry is adding further attendance measures for schools to implement next year to support regular attendance. For us as a school this means that we will continue to work with all of our whānau, to support our tamariki in developing positive attendance habits, which may include us contacting you to talk through attendance patterns that we can see are developing and are not supporting your child/ren to attend regularly.

If you would like to understand more about what makes an absence justified you may find this <u>attendance code tree</u> helpful, along with our school policies, which can be found <u>here</u> (user name: hampdenstreet; password: ngatiawa and search attendance). Further, to support us in our accuracy in capturing absences, when notifying us of your child's absence, it is always appreciated when a reason for being away is provided e.g sick, medical appointment.

If you have any questions about your tamariki's attendance please don't hesitate to contact us, as we all have a part in this.





Rui: I am enjoying free writing. Right now I am doing it about mysteries. I start writing about solving mysteries. I try to write stuff about books I have been reading on Epic.






