Principal's View

Tena koutou e te whānau

Every three years we seek information from stakeholders within our HSS community about what their aspirations for us as a school are and what areas we should be focused on. Work has commenced for this triennial cycle through initial consultation with our staff and Board of Trustees, and this has led to the identification of three key areas of focus for the 2024-2025 period for us to gather feedback on from our tamariki, you - our whānau, and wider school community. The proposed key areas being:

- 1. Ako Innovative Teaching and Learning: This will focus on how we teach (our pedagogy) and our planning and assessment. We want to ensure that these are all aligned and consistent across our school.
- 2. Mauri Ora Overall Wellbeing: This will look at attendance and engagement at HSS, and what role whānau might play in this area. This area also covers student pastoral and learning support practices in our school, and how behaviour is managed within our school under the Positive Behaviour for Learning framework (PB4L).
- 3. Marautanga Our Curriculum: We will be looking at the refreshed NZ Curriculum, our local curriculum and stories, and how we give effect to Tiriti o Waitangi.

These are broad areas and within these areas we would like to hear from you about, firstly, how we have done so far and, looking to the future, what aspirations you have for your child within these areas.

Next week we will be sending out a survey to begin gathering your feedback. We would love to get representation from across our school population and so encourage you to complete it.

Once we have collated the survey results we will draw out some of the common threads and facilitate face-to-face whānau hui. This is where we can delve deeper into these questions so we can ensure our annual plan is focused on the identified needs.

Last year staff attended a symposium run by the coalition of the eight iwi from the top of the South, Te Kāhui Matauranga. This event was to launch the Kahui Matauranga aspirational education plan for our region, Te Tauihu. The plan, Ngā Kawatau me ngā Tūmanakotanga o Te Tauihu, will be the key document we draw upon as we consider iwi input into our strategic plan. We will also be consulting with our kaitiaki iwi, Rangatāne.

This work is an important part of the development of our school and ensuring that it is responsive to our school and wider community needs. Please take to opportunity to provide your input when we send the survey out soon.

During our afternoon PBL time, students are engaging in a variety of activities that combine fun and skill-building. The creativity of students shines through in the construction projects they undertake, from building intricate structures with blocks to crafting imaginative designs with recycled materials. The warm weather also encourages water play, where students have a splashingly good time while exploring the new pump and water toys.

A significant highlight for this term will be the emphasis on digital technologies exploration within a play-based framework. Through interactive games and creative digital tools, tamariki will jump into some innovative digital learning.

Wow! What a start to the term for the Middle Syndicate! We have come back refreshed and ready to tackle the last term of the year in style!




