# *Principal's View*

## **Dear Parents**

Earlier this week I accompanied a group of staff to Auckland to attend a talk from world renowned educationalist, Sir Ken Robinson, and to visit a couple of innovative schools. The trip was a good chance to reflect on what we do and to compare it to practices elsewhere and to hear Sir Ken's innovative big picture view of education.

His message is about the need to value all areas of the curriculum and to allow space and time for creativity. When we think of creativity we tend to think of art, drama and music but Sir Ken reminded us that creativity is something that is vital in all areas of the curriculum. He gave a wonderful example in Mathematics. He said when most people look at page of music they only see lines and notes, they know it is music, but they don't translate it into the music it represents. However, when a musician looks at a page of music they hear a symphony!

The same can be said in Mathematics when most look at a page of quadratic equations all we see is numbers and symbols with little understanding of how they relate. For a mathematician they see a "symphony". They see the processes and relationships. Coming up with these problems requires mathematical knowledge but to apply the processes and relationships necessary requires creativity. We tend to think of maths as something that we should be able to do at speed and that it is all about the right answer, but a mathematician would tell you quite the contrary, that maths requires creativity and time.

Allowing students to explore and develop their talents/ strengths while at school is vital. To deny them denies them from being the person they are. Our traditional educational systems tend to focus on an academic model that is set up for students to work hard and go to university. In doing so, many students who have talents and strengths that fall outside this academic model are underserved and often are left feeling the system doesn't fit them. We need to ensure that we provide a broad inclusive curriculum which celebrates all student's strengths, talents and cultural beliefs. This is a challenge but I feel it must be our ultimate goal.

Sir Ken Robinson has just released a book for parents called "You, Your Child and School – navigating your way to the best education." It would be well worth a read.

### ***HSS Community Co-ordinator***



Children are busy working on a literacy project where they are inspired to use camp as a motivation for writing. We have seen some excellent examples of writing so far and can't wait to share these with you.



Some interesting maths was occurring in room 4 the other day as they dived deeper into Sea Week learning and looked at the role mussels have in filtering our water and carried out an experiment to see how long mussels take to filter water. It was surprising to see just how quickly a mussel in a jar of muddy water cleaned it. Room 4 also looked at the parts of the mussel, they were amazed to find out

that the 'foot' is actually it's tongue! They each carried out a presentation on some aspect of Seaweeek and shared it with others. Room 4 firmly believe we must look after our oceans and our oceans will look after us! Its great to see children making connections to maths in the real world.

On Friday 16th March, 27 of our super senior syndicate scientists visited the Science Roadshow at Nelson Intermediate. They saw some amazing presentations and were able to challenge their thinking by taking part in a number of interactive experiments. Some of their thoughts for the day were...

Bella: They were really fun experiments and I learnt lots. My favourite experiment was the tin can amp as I learnt about how sound travels.

Ella: I thought it was really fun, especially as we got to do things and not just look at them. I loved the spinning chair. When I huddled up I went fast and when I spread out I went slower.

Neo: It was a really fun day because they weren't grumpy old scientists and enjoyed having a joke. I really liked the liquid nitrogen experiment as it looked all smoky. It was like being in a smoke machine.



Tom and I have been lucky enough to attend a talk with Sir Ken Robinson. We also got to visit a couple of schools in Auckland and see how they ran their programmes. It has challenged our thinking and we are looking forward to making some changes to the way we deliver our programme that encourages self-management skills and more opportunities for student led learning.




